The Buffalo Trace Council is making a difference. For 108 years, our Council has been dedicated to serving local youth. Beginning with only 14 boys and a single Troop, the Buffalo Trace Council has grown into a movement serving over 2,500 boys and girls in four programs spanning 15 counties - Dubois, Gibson, Knox, Perry, Pike, Posey, Spencer, Vanderburgh, and Warrick in Southern Indiana, and Edwards, Gallatin, Lawrence, Richland, Wabash, and White in Illinois.



In 2022, the Council experienced tremendous SUCCESS ranking 44th of 248 in the nation for market share of Total Available Youth (T.A.Y). Moreover, we reached our membership goals with 16% growth in Cub Scouts and 6% growth across all programs over last year. The Buffalo Trace Council collaborates with more than 100 organizations, or chartered partners, across our communities to provide direct support to 133 units. Our Scouts, volunteers, staff, donors, and families continue to be dedicated to the mission of Scouting. The Council's success is only because of their efforts. We invite you to join us in this exciting work of leadership development.

SCOUTING ADVENTURES



Cub Scouts

Cub Scouting is a family and home centered program that develops ethical decision-making skills for youth in kindergarten through fifth grade. Activities emphasize character development citizenship training, and personal fitness.



Scouts BSA

Scouts BSA is for boys and girls ages 11-18. Scouts develop awareness and appreciation of their role in their community and become well-rounded young men and women by advancing through the program using the Scout Oath and Scout Law as guides.

Scouts progress in rank through achievements, gain additional knowledge and responsibilities, and earn merit badges that introduce a lifelong hobby or career prospect.



Venturing

Venturing provides experiences to help young men and women, ages 14-20, become mature, responsible, and caring adults.

Young people learn leadership skills and participate in challenging outdoor activities which include access to BSA camping properties, a recognition program, Youth Protection Training, and leadership courses.



Exploring

Exploring teaches important life and career skills to young people, ages 14-20, through career experiences and mentorship provided by community and business leaders.

The program equips young people with character and leadership skills through hands-on learning experiences with experts in the field.

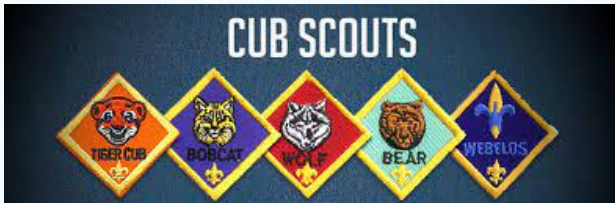

FALL FIELD DAY

After a successful recruitment through August and September, our Cub Scout Packs brought along their new numbers to launch their very own rocket at our three Fall Field Days. Cub Scouts totaling over 400, new and old, joined the fun and completed in team building games, shooting sports, and the much-anticipated rocketry. These events in Evansville, Vincennes, and Ferdinand were the first outdoor activity that our new Scouts participated in, and what better way to welcome them than to blast off into the stars!



UNIVERSITY OF SCOUTING

The University of Evansville hosted our first University of Scouting since the pandemic. Over 100 Scouters attended to learn about various educational topics including outdoor ethics and social media marketing. David Weyrick, BSA NST 9 Relations Lead, served as the keynote speaker and shared about how to use relationships to grow Scouting.

This year marked our second year for Mining in Society Merit Badge Day. We partnered with Vincennes University at their Fort Branch campus, where they have a simulated mine. The Scouts were able to go underground and explore what a mine looks like. Simulations included safety training by the Peabody Mining Company. In addition, Peabody officials shared about mining careers both above and below ground. We also had the Indiana State Mining Regulatory Service participate, and they discussed how regulation helps keep mining professionals safe in their workplaces. This event was a sell-out with 28 Scouts and 17 adults attending!

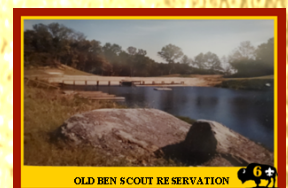
WESTERN FRONTIER CAMPOREE

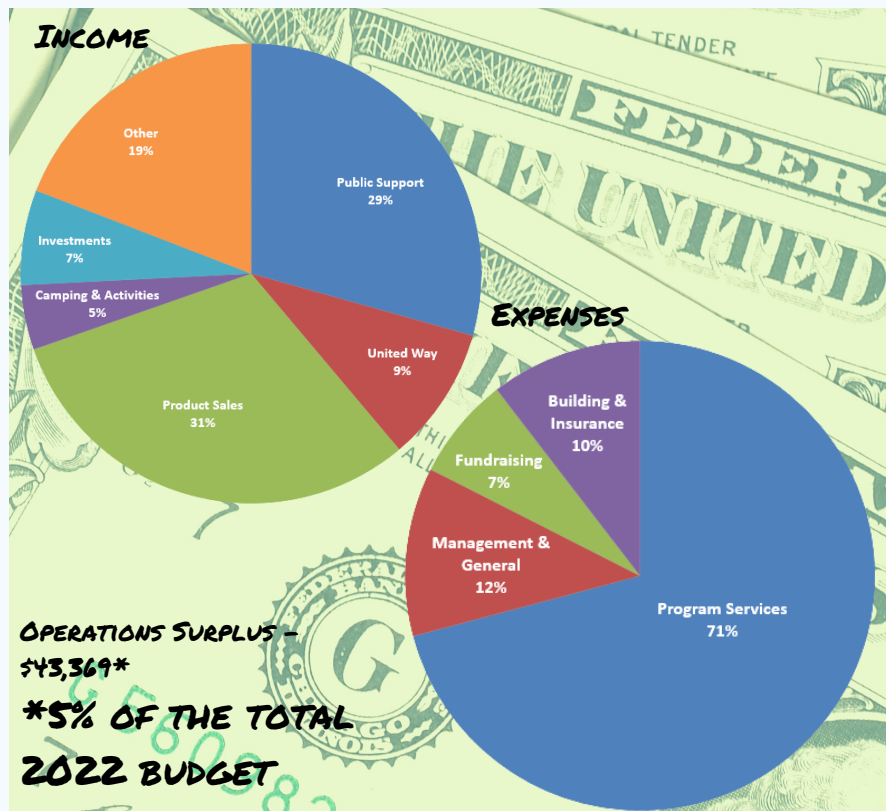

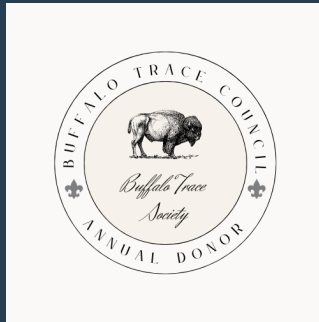
